CHAPTER 12 - PINELLAS COUNTY CULTURAL RESOURCES

ECONOMIC & COMMUNITY IMPACTS

A study sponsored by the St. Petersburg Arts Alliance, as part of a larger nationwide study conducted by Americans for the Arts¹, determined that the annual economic impact of arts and culture in Pinellas County for the year 2015 was \$241 million. Arts and cultural organizations and events in Pinellas County attracted over 4.2 million participants that same year and supported 7,211 jobs in the local workforce. The 47 Pinellas County arts and cultural organizations participating in this study spent \$100.2 million in the local economy that year and delivered \$29.8 million in local and state government revenues. Also, their audiences contributed an additional \$140.8 million to the local economy in event-related expenditures.

Another important statistic captured by this study reveals the significant contribution that volunteers make in assisting Pinellas County's nonprofit arts and cultural organizations. During 2015, a total of 5,097 volunteers donated 238,389 hours to participating organizations countywide. This amounts to an average of 108 individuals volunteering an average of 46.8 hours each for a total of 5,072 hours per organization. Using the hourly value of the average volunteer in 2015 of \$23.56 as calculated by Independent Sector², this represents a donation with an estimated aggregate value of \$5.6 million.

The organizations were asked about the sources and value of their in-kind support. In-kind contributions are noncash donations such as materials (e.g., office supplies from a local retailer), facilities (e.g., office or performance space), and services (e.g., printing from a local printer). The 47 participating nonprofit arts and cultural organizations in Pinellas County reported that they received in-kind contributions with an aggregate value of \$4,532,861 during fiscal year 2015. These contributions can be received from a variety of sources including corporations, individuals, local and state arts agencies, and government agencies. The arts continue to demonstrate a tremendous return on investment for communities by enhancing quality of life, encouraging relocation and retention of businesses, providing a forum for different views, neighborhood revitalization, and educating the public. The arts and cultural activities are agents of change. The economic impact of arts and cultural organizations in Pinellas County, the Tampa Bay area, as well as the nation, surpass that of professional sports.

PINELLAS COUNTY LOCAL ARTS AGENCY

The first countywide arts organization was The Pinellas County Arts Council created in 1976 by the Board of County Commissioners. In 2006, the organization was formally integrated into Pinellas County Government and renamed the Pinellas County Cultural Affairs Department. Creative Pinellas, a private nonprofit organization, was formed and recognized as the official local arts agency for the county in 2011. Its mission is to facilitate a vibrant, integrated, collaborative and sustainable arts community and promote the county as a premiere arts and cultural destination. The organization provides grants to artists and arts organizations; offers programs and activities focusing on arts education, collaboration and support; and promotes artists, organizations, facilities and events. The purpose of the ongoing cultural development program implemented by Creative Pinellas is to partner with artists, nonprofit cultural organizations, economic development agencies and local governments to enhance the stability and growth of the Creative Community in Pinellas County.

Creative Pinellas was created as a community-based organization with professional staff and a board of directors who encourage and facilitate greater and efficient use of governmental and private resources for the development and support of arts and culture. They serve to provide an informational and funding resource for artists, arts organizations, and the public in support of arts education and cultural activities, events and facilities, as a basic service to all citizens.

Additional arts and cultural venues include colleges and universities, churches, commercial galleries, restaurants, office buildings, libraries, and various governmental facilities. There are also numerous cultural organizations in the County focusing on dance, music, ethnic heritage, theater, visual arts, poetry and writing, folk arts, historic preservation, and science. Also, within the county three umbrella organizations have been formed--the St Petersburg Arts Alliance, the Clearwater Arts Alliance, and the North Pinellas Cultural Alliance--to assist with interlocal efforts to enhance and promote cultural events, facilities, and programs.

PUBLIC ART AND DESIGN PROJECTS

County-sponsored public art projects have been installed at various facilities such as the St. Petersburg-Clearwater International Airport, the Pinellas County Courthouse, the Criminal Justice Center, the Brooker Creek Preserve and the Pinellas Trail. The public art program is coordinated on a project-by-project basis as funding becomes available through the annual budget process. Its purpose is to enhance the economic vitality of the County through the enrichment of public spaces. Creative Pinellas maintains a database and contact list of artists with portfolios that include public art installations. Pinellas County has adopted a Public Art ordinance that allows up to one percent of the cost of major capital improvement projects be set aside for public art on site. In 2007, the Public Art and Design Master Plan was adopted by the Board of County Commissioners to provide guidance and direction on a public art program for the County. This program is overseen by the County's Public Art & Design Committee, a group of arts professionals, architects, government officials and citizens. At the municipal level, both St. Petersburg and the City of Oldsmar have ordinances that designate a percentage of their budgets for arts funding and have appointed public art commissions

ACCESSIBILITY TO CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

For cultural activities to have the greatest impact, they need to be available to all segments of the population. Availability of cultural opportunities in Pinellas County is not as problematic as the issue of accessibility. Transportation can be an issue for low to moderate-income residents and some senior citizens. While many cities and private, not-for-profit agencies offer classes, performances and exhibits that are low in cost, residents may be unable to get to the offerings. Although some providers have brought art and cultural opportunities to traditionally underserved communities, certain unincorporated areas, such as Lealman, Ridgecrest, and Highpoint, largely remain underserved, partly due to funding limitations. Accessibility and other important cultural resource facility issues are addressed in the report Regional Arts Dialogue: Maximizing the Arts Impact for Pinellas County prepared by Creative Pinellas in 2017.
